# Speaker: Theresa Hill, "Paphiopedilum charlesworthii a Giant Among Miniatures"



Theresa Hill is a partner in Hillsview Gardens, growers of fine quality Paphiopedilums, Miltoniopsis, and Masdevallias. Hillsview Gardens supplies a wide variety of hybrids and species – from connoisseur-quality divisions and specimen plants for discriminating hobbyists, cutting-edge hybrids in wholesale quantities for retail nurseries, and

outstanding decorator quality plants to chain stores in Portland, Oregon. Hillsview Gardens has been breeding orchids for 32 years since the operation began in 1985, and since that time received well over 150 American Orchid Society awards, including five FCC/AOS, a Gold Certificate, seven Awards of Quality and a Bronze Award at the 16th World Orchid Conference in Vancouver, BC.


#### 2022 NW Flower & Garden Festival


Our next big event is the 2022 NW Flower & Garden Festival. We are designing a walk-through garden space complete with a Victorian style glass greenhouse in the center.

**NWF&G Festival - Your Orchids Are Needed!** 



We need your BLOOMING ORCHIDS to help fill out the interior of the Hartley Botanic Victorian-style greenhouse at the center of our garden. Any blooming orchid qualifies as long as it is clean, pest and disease free, and the flowers will last for at least one week.

### **Orchids can arrive:**

- 1 pm to 5 pm on Sunday, Feb 6
- 9 am to 1 pm Monday, Feb 7

IF you bring your orchids on Sunday, there will be plenty of 4-wheeled carts to use at the "Hand Carried Freight" elevator. However, on Monday, carts will be scarce as you will be competing with all of the Marketplace Vendors who will be moving in that day.

Incidentally, the orchids that will be "planted" in the garden area outside of the greenhouse have been purchased by the NWOS from a variety of orchid nurseries across the US. There will be a variety of named, blooming Paphiopedilums, Oncidiums, Dendrobiums, Cymbidiums, and more! All of these orchids will be available for purchase at the February 14 general meeting as well as the March 14 NWOS Auction. Although it's best to get them at the February meeting as they will still be in bloom.

#### My Orchids Want To Participate, What Do I Need To Do?

- 1. Write your name or initials on a piece of blue painter's masking tape (it won't smudge or come off if it gets wet) or use an address label. Affix the tape or label to each orchid pot. Affix the tape or label to your plant trays and packing boxes too.
- 2. Print a list of plants with your contact information and the name of each orchid or flower. Please indicate how you will be picking up your plants -- either on Sunday, Feb 13 after 6 pm at the WSCC or at the Monday, Feb 14 meeting at 7 pm.
- 3. Clean and trim the leaves as needed, check for any visible pests and diseases, stake the flower spikes if needed to prevent breakage in transport; the usual routine to prep plants for a show.
- 4. Package your orchids in a sturdy box or tray. Did you label your box or trays?

#### **How Do I Get There?**

see the map on how to get to the Convention Center's Main Parking Garage. The garage is located underneath the WSCC between Pike and Seneca streets.




Once inside the garage, follow the signs to the "Hand-Carried Freight" elevator. Take your parking ticket with you, get it stamped (If you are in and out of the garage within one hour, you don't pay). Pick up a "Work Pass" and put it on your clothing. Ride the elevator to the 4th floor loading dock.

Walk straight ahead through the clear plastic curtain to the Show floor. Our garden is straight ahead next to the rightmost concrete pillar. See the map if you need help locating us or are entering from the 4th floor Atrium entrance.

#### **NWF&G Festival - Helpers Needed**



The 2022 NW Flower and Garden Festival is fast approaching. We are in need of YOU to help us build our 1,008 sq ft orchid garden.

I have broken out each day into 3-hour shifts to make things easier. Feel free to sign up for one or more shifts as your time allows.

If you would like to sign-up, please send an email to fgs@nwos.org with your requested shift(s) and contact information. A sponsor will be purchasing new name badges for volunteers who sign up before the **end of day January the 14th**.

"Setup" workpasses - for those of you who sign up to help us build or tear down the garden, you can obtain a "Work Pass" from the WSCC door guards as you enter the Show floor (4th floor) Convention Center. The same goes if you enter via the Hand-Carried Freight elevator entrance in the Main parking garage between Pike and Seneca streets.

"Show" wristbands - for those of you who sign up to work a shift during the Show (Feb 9 - 13), your color-coded wristbands (unique for each day) will be available at the Will-Call window on the 4th floor. From the Pike Street entrance, follow the escalator signs up to the 4th floor Atrium, turn left to see the "Will-Call" window. Just give your Name and "NWOS" to get your envelope. Your envelope will contain all of the wristbands needed to enter each day that you signed up to work.

So make sure you sign up!

Below are the days and shifts that need a few more helpers. All shifts require wearing a mask per WA State Covid guidelines. The minimum age allowed on the floor during Setup and Teardown is 16 and no pets.

**Saturday, February 5** - This is "heavy lifting" day. Bring gloves and dress in layers. If previous years are an indication, there may be some "standing around" waiting for our materials to arrive.

- 9 am to 12 pm
- 12 pm to 3 pm
- 3 pm to 6 pm

**Sunday, February 6** - Finishing of the hardscape materials, installing foliage plants, and slinging sawdust. Orchids arrive today and will need to be labeled and grouped by color.

**Monday, February 7** - Orchids are labeled, grouped by color, and installed in the garden and greenhouse today. Sod and planters are installed. More orchids will probably arrive today. Moss and low-voltage lights are installed towards the end of day.

- 6 pm to 9 pm
- 9 pm to 12 am

Tuesday, February 8 - This is "finishing touches" day.

• 7 am to 12 pm

Per King County and State regulations, to be allowed entry into the Show (Feb 9 - 13) all people ages 12 and older will be required to show "proof of full Covid-19 vaccination" or a negative test result. Wearing a mask is required for all shifts.

• 8 am until finished. Hopefully by 6 pm due to General Meeting that evening

NOTE: The orchids within the garden (not inside the greenhouse) were bought-in and can be purchased at the February 14 Meeting to help the Society recoup its

costs. Anything left over will be available at the March 14 Auction. But get the plants early while they are still in bloom!

#### **Orchid Seed Workshop**

Before the holidays began in November, we had our first orchid seed germination workshop. Steve Dorsey hosted a group of enthusiastic growers of NWOS for a gathering to learn how to grow orchids from seed.

Growing orchids from seed may seem daunting, but this workshop was given to show that it is quite achievable in a home setting without elaborate or expensive equipment. All the items used were easily obtained. And while some seeds such as Paphiopedilum may take years to bloom, others such as Habenaria can be blooming within a year and a half. So don't let the time to bloom dissuade you from trying from seed. There are several that will bloom in a reasonable time.

Orchid seeds are small, so it doesn't take many to produce a lot of plants. Unlike many other seeds, they don't have any nutrients with them, so the food supply to cause germination has to be supplied. This is done by preparing media with agar, and nutrients which is simply done by boiling water and adding the powder mix to it. Using a simple canning pressure cooker provides sterile media for the seeds to grow in.

It is necessary to keep things very clean and to work in a sanitized area as bacteria and fungus in the air will damage the seeds. There are many options such as simply working in a plastic storage box with holes for your hands to poke through and up to what is pictured, which is a laminar flow box.



The important issue is to keep it clean while working. Seeds can be gained from partially developed seed pods called green pod or from seeds that have been released from fully mature and cracked seed pods.

Because green pods are much easier to decontaminate, they were used for demonstrating placing seeds into the agar containers. The process is simple, just care is needed for sowing the seeds.



Once seeds are sown, then you just have to wait to see the little green blobs appear. I find that exciting as you then know you are on your way to making new plants. And in time you will have more plants than you need, so there will be





If you enjoy plants in general and have ever had a garden with plants you started from seed, this is a

great way to have that same pleasure and who knows, you may create your own orchid that wins an award.

More workshops will be offered starting in the spring, so keep an eye out on the events listings on the NWOS webpage.





## **Report From The December Meeting**






