**Speaker:** Andy Easton, "Warmth-tolerant Miniature and Intermediate Cymbidiums"

Professional orchid grower since graduation from Colorado State University in 1972. Accredited as AOS judge in 1978, since retired! Grew orchids in Santa Barbara 1978-1985 then moved back to New Zealand and started Geyserland Orchids. Returned to Florida as AOS Director of Education 2000. Moved back to California in 2007 and operated New Horizon Orchids until 2018 when we moved the business to Colombia. Plants housed at Colomborquideas where I work primarily with Cymbidiums, the Odontoglossum Alliance and a hobby collection of Cattleyas.



1st VP Note: What Andy hasn't mentioned in his brief bio is that he had had not only an illustrious career as a commercial orchid grower, judge and educator spanning multiple continents. He is a prodigious hybridizer. Of the nearly 10,000 hybridizers that have been creating orchid hybrids over nearly 170 years Andy is responsible for approximately 1 in every 100 orchid hybrids and nearly 9% of all Cymbidium hybrids. Andy's hybridizing ranks him right after Charlesworth, Sander's and The Eric Young Orchid Foundation. Additionally over 430 of Andy's hybrids have been awarded, a remarkable achievement.

Andy has imported a number of his Cymbidium hybrids and they will be available on the raffle table. This is an opportunity you won't want to miss.



# Help Needed for NWOS Scholarship Criteria Review

For decades the NWOS has offered scholarships for orchid research to students at 2- and 4-year institutions in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. There have been several problems: few applicants, research proposals that seem reasonable but not acceptable to the NWOS board, and failure by students to do their projects.

# Time to Get Rid of Bugs before Bringing Orchids Inside

The days are getting shorter and night temperatures are falling so I'm getting ready to bring most of my orchids inside from my greenhouse. Inside means they will be crowded together on shelves under LED lights. I find it much harder to spot bugs under lights than in sunlight so I will treat all of my plants with at least two sprays a couple of weeks apart with neem oil and insecticidal soap or a combo.

If you treat your orchids with non-toxic methods, I'd love to hear from you so I can share your tips.

# Results from the 2nd show at the Washington State Fair 2021

- Four members registered for 52 orchid entrees in 21 different classes.
- 8 entrees received Honorable Mention
- 8 entrees placed in 3<sup>rd</sup>
- 12 entrees placed in 2<sup>nd</sup>
- 17 entrees placed in 1st, including a best culture and a best bloom
- Joseph Grienauer received the best culture for his Maxillaria picta
- Repeating his previous award, Thuan Nguyen received best bloom for his Paphiopedilum Prince Edward of York

# **Report From The September Meeting**

Our president, Joe Grienauer, began the meeting by welcoming everyone to our first in-person meeting in over a year. How nice it is to see and be able to enjoy each other's company again. Ben gave an Orchid Basics talk about "How do you know your orchids are getting enough light?"



Joe then welcomed people who are new to our society. He reviewed the report from the Nominating Committee. We need a 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President. George Grantham described the position. We also need 3 Board Members. Chris Peterson asked for help as treasurer by asking for an assistant treasurer.

Joe gave thanks to Robert Culver for all that he's done pulling this meeting together as well as his leadership with creating and updating the website. He gave thanks also to Steve Dorsey for his mentorship and home orchid flasking programs.

Joe also spoke about the society's library and our upcoming participation in the Washington State Fair. Thuan Nguyen will coordinate taking plants and registering them for the second phase of the exhibit at the Fair. Because of new UW regulations, we will not be able to have our traditional Pot Luck dinner at the December meeting. Robert reviewed the plant table.

Our speaker, Bob Hamilton, spoke about the orchid craze during the 19<sup>th</sup> century in England. This Victorian era of flower madness was called Orchidelirium. Explorers brought plants back from the new world including the Andes mountains. The inventions of science spurred this craze. It included Darwin, genetics, technology, factories and glassmaking (for the creation of greenhouses). He also discussed how the shift from symbiotic reproduction to asymbiotic reproduction changed the ability to produce more orchids, including hybrids. The orchid craze went from Conservatory to Costco.

Bob also showed his husband, John Leathers' Masdevallias and Draculas. We then got to see Bob's Odontoglossums, from the foundational crispum and nobile to many hybrids.

September's raffle table was super-sized, which raised several hundred dollars for our Scholarship program. Besides the usual plant donations, our speaker, Bob Hamilton, very generously donated many plants from his own collection. Several of them were in bloom. Members went home with lots of new plants to enjoy learning about how to grow and bloom. With so many plants, everyone was able to go home with something new. What fun!
